### **School**

All the children have enjoyed the different work that they have been learning throughout the week and the classrooms have been buzzing with activity. Here is an overview of what has been happening in every class.

**Amethyst class:** This week in Amethyst Class, we have finished reading 'Peace at Last' by Jill Murphy. We sequenced pictures and retold the story using puppets, We also read 'Five Minutes Peace.' In maths, we have explored how numbers can be made of 1's and from this investigated the composition of numbers 3 and 4. We began to recognise that 3 and 4 could be made from combining sets in different ways. We also had fun making bug hotels and homes for insects in the mud kitchen area.

**Sapphire class:** This week we have enjoyed our second forest school session where we did a minibeast hunt and made houses for hedgehogs! In English we have been focusing on using capital letters correctly in names and our sentences. In Maths, we have been counting objects and counting objects from a group of 10. In the afternoons, we have enjoyed looking at some Victorian artefacts in History, we sorted and drew physical and human geographical features, we also enjoyed doing some singing and using some different musical instruments.

**Pearl class:** This week Pearl Class have been looking at number lines with intervals of 1s and 10s. We have looked for patterns in numbers when counting in 1s and 10s up to 100. In Science we have learnt the word 'absorbent.' We looked different items which are absorbent and completed an investigation to test the absorbency of different brands of kitchen roll. We used scientific equipment such as pipettes and learnt how to write an aim and hypothesis/prediction. In RE we discussed thoughtful questions to ask the shepherd and the lost sheep and the children took part in a 'hot seating' drama activity. In Music we matched our percussion instrument to the effect we wanted to create. We have been practising our songs for the harvest assembly and we can't wait to perform. In English the children participated in role-play and used their improvisations to write sentences in role about other characters in 'Troll Swap'.

Amber class: This week year 3 have compared and ordered numbers to 1,000 and looked at estimating on a number line. The class have written riddles about seals in English and worked with speech marks for the first time. The children prepared cave wall backgrounds in art using textures, looked at fossils in science, learned about primary sources in history and enjoyed working on their Stone Age museum posters in DT.

**Emerald class:** This week, Emerald Class have been writing an Autumn poem to read in church. They have been thinking about all the wonders of Autumn and how beautiful it is. The children have also been designing their own torches and have been learning about how atoms move within an electrical circuit. In History, they have written a fact sheet about Queen Victoria and in English, they have been writing a fact sheet about gorillas.

**Ruby class:** During this week, Year 5 have worked hard writing a paragraph about Frank Russell who was Annie Edson Tyler's manager. We have been looking at whether he had Annie's best interests at heart or whether he was exploiting Annie. We have started a new unit in Maths, addition, and subtraction. Year 5 have used their knowledge of adding and subtracting to solve reasoning and problem-solving questions. During Science, we completed our investigation on friction, using a newton metre to measure how much friction a school shoe causes whilst being dragged across a specially selected surface, the classroom carpet. Again, the class have shown a strong work ethic in all the other subjects producing some great work.











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**Diamond class:** This week in Diamond Class, we have been focusing on identifying common factors and common multiples, using our times-tables knowledge to help us. In English, we have been writing diary entries based on a photo from the 1940's of children watching a dog-fight in the sky. We then peer assessed each other's work based on handwriting, spelling and cohesive devices, such as fronted adverbials and intentional repetition. In History, we looked at the speeches of Winston Churchill and created a found poem using the most inspirational parts, and later in the week, we looked at artefacts from the Blitz and wrote arguments about which English city was the worst affected.

This week's result is partly affected by an outbreak of chicken-pox in Sapphire class. In EYFS/KS1, Amethyst class has again had the highest attendance and, in KS2, Diamond class had the best attendance this week. Congratulations to both classes.
