As a school we are concentrating on the 5 'R's - resilience, reflectiveness, responsibility, resourcefulness and readiness to learn. These are the children who have shown such qualities this week: Resilience: John Broomhall, Seb McComb Reflectiveness: Austin Wright, James Carlin Responsibility: Hugo Higgins, Seth Minshall Readiness to Learn: Maisie Hallatt

<u>School</u>

All the children have enjoyed the different work that they have been learning throughout the week and the classrooms have been buzzing with activity. Here is an overview of what has been happening in every class.

Amethyst class: In Amethyst Class this week, we finished reading 'Peace at Last' by Jill Murphy. We sequenced the pictures and retold the story using puppets, We also read 'Five Minutes Peace.' In maths, we explored how numbers can be made of 1's and investigated the composition of number three and four. On Friday, we had fun completing our first Amaven PE fitness test with Mr Bradley.

Sapphire class: In maths this week we have been using the less than, greater than and equal to symbols and comparing numbers. In English, we have been re-telling the story of "Look Up" and we are going to start writing our own versions. In science we have been looking at healthy and unhealthy foods and why it is important to eat healthily and in geography we have been sketching buildings of Audlem for our display.

Pearl class: This week in Pearl class we have been writing a diary entry as Tabitha and we have been explaining all the cheeky things she got up to when she swapped to a troll! We have been continuing to use 'and' and 'because' in our sentences and we have worked hard to include commas and apostrophes. In Maths we have been writing numbers to 100 in expanded form and we have looked at different ways of partitioning two-digit numbers. The children have also carried out an investigation to test which materials changed shape by squashing, bending, stretching and twisting.

Amber class: We have had an amazing week in Amber class. We have loved writing character descriptions based on the boy and his grandfather from our focus text "Seal Surfer". We drew around our friends before writing statements about each character in the outline. In our topic work we have looked at how and why Stone Age people started farming. We also created our own farms and then drew bird's eye view maps of our creations. In Science we have been learning about weathering and erosion and how this affects rocks.

Emerald class: This week, Emerald Class have practised rounding 4 digit numbers to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000 in maths. In English, they have worked on using speech marks. They have written speech sandwiches between Hannah and the gorilla and a lively description of the pair's feast in a colourful cafe. In Science, they investigated animal ears and how animals turn their ears towards sound waves. In History, they studied Victorian inventions and pitched their favourite Victorian invention to the class. The children had a brilliant outing to their first singfest rehearsal for music and looked at how religious beliefs shape people's lives in RE. The children investigated how Bear Grylls lives his life from a Christian perspective.

Ruby class: This week in Ruby Class, we have been working on addition and subtraction, both mentally and through column methods. We have also been using our knowledge of inverse operations to work on algebra questions. In English, we have been working on fronted adverbials to express time, place and manner. We had a mini-competition to see who could write the best ending to the adverbial 'In the middle of the night,...', and on Thursday, we began to look at emotive language as a persuasive tool, focusing on how this can be used in a charity appeal. In History, we have learned about the Canary Girls - the women who went to work in munitions factories during WW1. We found out what the conditions were like for them - the pros and cons, and how propaganda may have been used to persuade them into the jobs. In Art, we have been looking at the WW1 sketches of Cheshire artist, William Hutchings. We recreated one of his sketches, then, after watching a snippet of Derren Brown, attempted to redo our picture upside down to really focus on the shapes that make up a person's face. The class have discussed what Living Well together means in our school, and the behaviour systems in place to help us all get along swimmingly. In RE, we have been learning how the Hindu god, Brahman is described in the Bhagavad-Gita. We compared this to St. Francis of Assisi's Canticle of the Creatures (showing God's glory throughout nature). We then engaged in a philosophical debate about the existence of God - arguments for and against, and the counter-arguments throughout.



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Diamond class: In Year 6 this week, the children have been learning about the 'Appeasement' during WW2. They have analysed the reasons why Neville Chamberlain was in favour of appeasement through the Munich Agreement, and why he thought it would bring 'peace for our time'. We also studied the opposing views of Winston Churchill. The children then carried out a lively debate, acting as members of parliament debating their different views about the agreement. It was very heated and Mrs Bird had to call 'order, order' quite a few times, but the children loved it and were very good at using counter-arguments.
