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<u>School</u>

All the children have enjoyed the different work that they have been learning throughout the week and the classrooms have been buzzing with activity. Here is an overview of what has been happening in every class.

Amethyst class: In Amethyst Class we have read the story, 'Peace at Last' by Jill Murphy and 'Don't Hog the Hedge!' We sang teddy bear songs, talked about bedtime routines and drew our favourite teddies. In maths, we built on the children's 'subitising' skills and investigated the shapes made by Numberblock Four. We worked with our talking partners to make similar arrangements with multilink cubes. We have also enjoyed finding about nocturnal animals, researched facts about hedgehogs and made our own 'Night-time' pictures using chalk.

Sapphire class: Another busy week in Sapphire class. In maths the children have been learning how to count forwards and backwards up to ten and beyond starting from any number. They have also been learning how to work out one more than and one less from numbers up to ten. In English the children have been learning about Wilma Rudolph became the fastest woman at running. In science the children have been taking on the role of anatomists during our activities about our bodies. In geography the children have constructed sentences using geopraphical language to describe their journey to church last Friday.

Pearl class: In Forest school this week the children looked at the book 'The Lost Words' and developed their vocabulary using nature, for example oak and acorn. In Mathematics, we have explored place value charts and developed understanding of the place value of two-digit numbers. We have also completed Week 2 of the Mastering Number Programme. The children have also developed their sketching skills of the Tudor buildings, which we saw during our visit to Nantwich museum. They used printing inks to transform sketches into prints. In English, we have read the first part of 'The Troll' in whole-class guided reading and practised writing skills as pirates! In Science, we have investigated various materials by stretching, twisting, bending and squashing. In Religious Education, we have developed our understanding of baptisms for Christian children.

Amber class: This week in Forest Schools, Amber class held a gripping competition to find out who could build the longest-lasting fire. We discovered it was actually Mr Davies! In English, all sorts of poetry has been performed in class following on from last week's National Poetry Day. In maths we have been completing our work on place value and in PE we used warm-up games to prepare for a tag rugby match and practised our skills on the wobble boards.

Emerald class: This week in Emerald class we have spent some time rounding to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000. We have investigated negative numbers and used number lines to visualise these numbers below zero. At the end of the week, we learnt about Roman Numerals. In English, the children wrote a lively description of the cafe scene between Hannah and the gorilla. They used speech marks, fronted adverbials and described their nouns beautifully using noun phrases. The children thought about Hannah's emotions throughout the story and wrote a diary entry as Hannah. The children thought about why Muhammad is so important for Muslims in RE, studied pitch and volume in Science and learnt about the positive changes Lord Shaftesbury made for British children in History. The class had a brilliant time at our first SINGfest rehearsal where they started learning lyrics and actions for the space and earth medleys. They also practised a variety of fun musical warm ups.

Ruby class: In maths this week, Ruby Class have been revising and boosting their knowledge of column addition and subtraction, as well as learning tips, tricks and interesting mathematical facts about the 3x table.

In English, we have been writing rhetorical questions, précising paragraphs into shorter sentences and writing diary entries from the perspective of Jackie Robinson.

In science, we have been making parachutes from different materials and testing them outside to see which utilises air resistance the best and gives a small group of rubber animals the softest landing.

In history, we have been learning about female munitions workers, the side effects of working in the factories, and the propaganda used to encourage the women to sign up. The children have also been cracking messages written in Morse code. In RE, we have been looking at passages in the Bible that teach about courage, and thinking about whether God wants us to worry.

Diamond class: This week in Diamond Class, we have been writing recipe poems about ourselves. The children have used some wonderful creativity to think of interesting ways to create a recipe on how to make the perfect them. They have also been learning how to round large numbers and the difference between specular and diffuse reflection. In history, we have been discussing at what point could World War 2 have been avoided - lots of different opinions!

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School Attendance, including Persistent Absences and Holidays during Term Time

The government has a persistence absence threshold of 10%. The absence threshold of 10% means that if a pupil is absent for 38 sessions (19 days) of school, they are classified as persistently absent. Schools are urged to inform parents of this threshold and to advise parents that fines will be made for persistent absence, unless there is evidence of a justifiable reason for such absence, for example, significant illness. Failure to make payment will result in legal action for failure to ensure regular attendance at school under Section 444 (1) Education Act 1996. Guidance concerning holidays taken in school term time is clear - holidays will only be authorised in <u>exceptional</u> circumstances and both schools and Local Authorities are expected to ensure that such circumstances are not that holidays are cheaper during term time.

Timeline	Penalty Charges
Paid within 21 days	£60 per parent per child
After 21 days and before 28 days	£120 per parent per child
After 28 days	The parent will receive a summons to appear before the Magistrate's Court on the grounds of having failed to secure their child/ children's regular attendance

An exceptional circumstance is usually a one-off, unique situation that is of significant emotional, educational or spiritual value which outweighs the loss of teaching time. It is my duty to strongly urge parents or carers to avoid booking holidays, appointments or visits overseas during term-time. In addition, it is important that I advise you that under the legislation there is an expectation that schools will issue a Penalty Notice to those parents who take their children on an unauthorised leave of absence (holiday) in term time.

Please bear this guidance in mind when making bookings for any holidays. It is important that children attend school regularly and do not miss extended periods of learning during term time. Therefore, in line with guidance, requests for holidays during term time will not usually be authorised.
