#### School

All the children have enjoyed the different work that they have been learning throughout the week and the classrooms have been buzzing with activity. Here is an overview of what has been happening in every class.

Amethyst class: This week in Amethyst Class, we continued to read 'The Three Little Pigs,' by Mara Alperin. We added sound buttons to words, described the wolf and made 'Watch Out Wolf' posters. In maths, we compared the number of objects in 2 sets by matching them 1:1 and reinforced the language of 'more than', 'fewer than' and 'an equal number' to describe how many objects there were in each set. We also enjoyed spending time with our Year 6 buddies for our 'Wellbeing Wednesday' activity.

**Sapphire class:** This week in Sapphire Class we have enjoyed learning about Child Rights and have had some excellent discussions and created some beautiful pieces of work about having shelter. The children have also enjoyed using 'greater than' and 'fewer than' in Maths and learning about how to compare amounts. The children have impressed me with their beautiful singing voices as we have been learning our Nativity songs.

**Pearl class:** The children in Pearl class have discussed the UN Convention's Rights of a Child. The children recognise the right to be cared for, have a name, a home, enough to eat and drink and to be safe from harm. Y2 considered the right to breathe clean air and created posters to persuade others to reduce pollutants. In English, we explored the use of adverbs and adjectives to describe fireworks and create a poem. In maths, we have been adding ones to two-digit numbers using a number-line. In computing we have created lines of code to create a collision event where the Princess collided with a frog and turned him into a prince. In Science we have thought about suitable and unsuitable materials for different jobs. The children loved discussing how useful a chocolate teapot would be! In RE we have started looking at the Christmas Story from the point of view of the angel, shepherds and wise men. For anti-bullying week we talked about what to do if we are concerned or worried about ourselves or others and we all participated in a 'kind words only' activity.

Amber class: This week in Amber class the children have worked on adding and subtracting 1-digit numbers from three-digit numbers when the ones cross a ten. They have written letters from the boy to Grandad telling him about seeing the seal and her baby. The children evaluated their electric posters in DT and started to learn about how bronze was made in History. The class enjoyed their recorders session where they composed a 6 beat tune and they loved working on their sprinting in PE. The children looked at the work of sculptor Robert Morris in Art and made small sculptures out of cardboard shapes. They loved using slots and balancing materials to make them 3D.

**Emerald class:** This week, Emerald Class have been learning about malware and the risks of downloading software onto their devices. They have also been practising their Christmas songs and are getting very excited about singing them at the Big Switch On next week. In PSHE, the class have been thinking about the UN Rights of the Child, and have been reading a picture book about children's rights. Our class have been thinking, in particular, about the right to find out what a true friend is.

**Ruby class:** During this week, Year 5 have been planning and writing a recount of their extraordinary World War I day on Friday 9<sup>th</sup> November. We first identified the features of a recount by looking at a WAGOLL and then used the criteria to help us write. In Maths, we have been looking at what factors are, learning that they are numbers that divide directly into another number without a remainder, which lead us on to common factors. In Science, we have been learning about Aristotle and how he was able to tell the Earth was spherical











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and not flat. Ruby class have also been practicing the Christmas songs ready for the Big Switch-On in Audlem on Friday 24<sup>th</sup> November.

**Diamond class:** This week, Diamond Class have been treated to a fascinating talk by Mrs Gunstone on the experiences of her father, Richard Dowland, who was a POW in Japan during the second World War. The children then completed a writing task based on the information they gathered and the artefacts they were able to handle. In English, we have begun to write about how an advert, raising awareness about the plight of tigers, made us feel and how it managed to do this. In Science, we have created simple circuits, tested whether objects are conductors or insulators by inserting them into a circuit, and completed quizzes on the symbols for different electrical components. As part of Art and PSHE, the class created a collaborative piece of charcoal artwork on the right of a child not to experience violence, and we enjoyed a No Outsiders workshop led by Andrew Moffatt MBE.

<u>Attendance:</u> Whole school weekly attendance this week is 93.48%. This is much lower than our school aim of at least 97% but is due in part to the many cases of chicken-pox throughout school especially in Y6 this week. In EYFS/KS1, the highest attendance has been in Sapphire class and, in KS2, Ruby class has had the best attendance this week. Congratulations to both classes.
