

Thought of the Week

In the current pandemic, sadly, we see and hear that for some children, even the basic needs are not being met - despite any desire to grow as a person, the capacity to fulfil these needs and lay the basic building blocks are out of their control. For us as adults, even working up the pyramid, we are finding our usual means of safety, a sense of belonging and self-esteem are being constantly challenged. So how can we change our view on this when so much feels unknown and outside of our control?



St Paul gives us a different perspective in writing to the Romans, 5:3-5. Growth doesn't begin with physiological or safety needs - but in a time of tribulation! At the point of insecurity, he begins with rejoicing in the hope of the glory of God...keeping eyes on the wonders of a good God and his son Jesus, he can carry on, growing in strength and character and increasing in the surety of hope in God's greater plan. We don't need to wait for physical needs to be met before growing in confidence, Paul calls the follower to begin by laying the foundation of trust in a mighty God, who gives his Holy Spirit to us, to journey alongside us.

That's easier said than done when all around us seems to be a constant act of spinning multiple plates. It's so important to take time to top up that internal reservoir with a source of hope that enables not only your character to grow, but can encourage those around you, fixing our eyes on the one who brings perfect hope.

School

The fact that the school is re-opening for all our children on Monday 8^{th} March is in everyone's thoughts. We are gearing up for the return of the whole school and teachers are ensuring that the class environments are ready for everyone. How lovely it will be to welcome every child again. As we approach our last week of remote learning, this is what the classes have been engaged in this week.

Stay at Home Heroes

Amethyst Class This week in Amethyst Class we have read the story The Gruffalo by Julia Donaldson. We have drawn and labelled characters from the story and practised reading, holding and writing a sentence. In maths, we have been looking at the numbers 9 and 10. We have read the story Ten Black Dots by Donald Crews, ordered numbers to ten and played bingo. We have also continued our Read Write Inc phonics lessons online and worked hard to earn more coins on Numbots.

Sapphire Class All the children in Sapphire class have worked super hard this week. In maths we have been learning to count in multiples of 2. In English we have been learning about past tense verbs. In science we have been learning about the seasons and how they affect the jobs that are carried out on farms. In R.E. the children have been thinking about what they are thankful for.

Pearl Class The children in Pearl Class have really enjoyed reading The Dragon Machine by Helen Ward and The Dragon Sitter by Josh Lacey. They created leaflets about how to care for dragons. They wrote commands and they used conjunctions to combine clauses in a sentence. In Art, they designed a 'Dragon Machine' invention to help George to take the dragons home. In Geography the children described places and then identified the physical and human features of a farm and the city using Harry's home as a stimulus. In Maths, the children identified equal and unequal groups as they developed the mathematical vocabulary related to multiplication.

Amber Class This week, Amber class have been exploring their new subjects for the new half term. In Reading and Writing we will be using two books to help our studies - Big Blue Whale in writing and This Morning I Met a Whale by Michael Morpurgo. Our new science topic is Plants. In our foundation studies this week we have created a factfile about a rainforest of our choice, we have been considering the 5 Pillars of Islam and we have taken inspiration from Monet & his impressionist style of art to create our own rainforest scene using the techniques he pioneered.



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Emerald Class We continued our Maths topic on measuring lengths and adding lengths this week. In English we discussed effective language and wrote descriptions inspired by magicians and wizards. We looked at tessellation in cross curricular Art and Maths, where each child created their own unique tessellation. We studied the Hindu festival of Kumbh Mela in R.E. and discovered what archaeological sites can tell us about Roman Britain in History. The children also worked really hard in their zoom P.E. lesson!

Ruby Class This week, Ruby Class have completed their unit on Perimeter and Area and have begun to look at angles. They have learned about different categories of angle such as: acute, right and obtuse. They have gone in search of angles in the wild, creating David Attenborough inspired videos of the angles they find in their local environment. In English, we have been writing recounts from Annie's perspective insider her barrel head toward Niagara Falls, and have met some mysterious animal characters in Odd & The Frost Giants!

In Science, we have been learning about the reproduction of plants, learning the names for the parts of plants and even dissecting them ourselves for a closer look.

We have begun to round off our History topic of Roman Britain by considering why the Romans left Britain and why the Anglo-Saxons came - writing party invites from Celtic king, Vortigern, to the Anglo-Saxons asking for their helps against the Picts. We have also played a game of musical instrument bingo!

Diamond Class During this first week back, Diamond Class have been very busy doing their live lessons and have been identifying the features of an animal report before writing their own. In maths, they have been learning more about decimal numbers and how to convert fractions to decimals, and in guided reading, they have begun to find out more about the Amazon Rainforest. For Science, they are looking forward to their 'live' session with 'Crazy Creatures' and hope to see some amazing invertebrates. We hope to tell you more about this next week!
