

School

In school this week we have been working hard on the Maths and English set by the teaching staff. I have seen some amazing work in Science, History, French, Art, Music and Design and Technology which showcases how enriched our curriculum still is even with all these restrictions around us. I would like to thank you for the positive feedback about the Parents Evening this week which again worked well. Some of the children have been working with Mr Hadfield in Forest schools and have been taught lots of different life skills to help them and the environment.

Stay at Home Heroes

Amethyst Class This week in Amethyst Class we have read the story Lost and Found by Oliver Jeffers. We have made a poster, played a red 'tricky' word game and learnt facts about penguins. In maths, we have been comparing height and length, looking at days of the week and measuring time. We have also continued our Read Write Inc phonics lessons online and worked hard to earn more coins on Numbots.

Sapphire Class The children in Sapphire class this week have worked very hard again. We have been sent lots of amazing stories. They have been learning about adjectives in English through the story of Rosie's walk. They have been working on making their sentences even more interesting. In maths, the children have been exploring 2-digit numbers and counting forwards and backwards to and from 50. In geography, the children have been designing maps of the farmyard from the story of Rosie's walk.

Pearl Class This week, Pearl Class celebrated Safer Internet Day by creating internet safety rules and posters. The theme was "Together for a better internet" and the children joined together in an attempt to make the internet a safer and better place for all, and especially for children and young people. They examined information found on the website to see if it was trustworthy and reliable. Pearl Class were excited to begin a new focus in English all about Dragons! We have read 'The Dragon Machine' by Helen Ward and had a sneak preview of our new class novel 'The Dragonsitter' by Josh Lacey. They have listened to poetry by Jackie Morris as a stimulus for creating their own dragons in art. Some pesky dragons escaped into Pearl Class and the children emailed Mr Perry to encourage him to investigate!

Amber Class This week, Amber class have been writing their own Stone Age narrative. Children have been putting together all the learning from this half term and ensuring their writing is as advanced as they can make it! In Maths, we have been looking at money and in our reading we completed our reading of The Iron Man by Ted Hughes. We have also listened to classical music (Peter & the Wolf and Benjamin Britten's Young Persons Guide to the Orchestra), looking at different muscles & muscle groups and have compared the Amazon Rainforest with Sherwood Forest here in the UK. Finally, we looked at the art work produced by Henri Rousseau, wrote a fact-file about him and tried to recreate some work of our own in his distinct style.

Emerald Class This week the children finished their Maths topic of area and started to look at perimeters. They focussed on TTRockstars and enjoyed participating in the girls vs boys battle in school. In English they looked at singular and plural nouns and using possessive apostrophes. They also recapped using apostrophes in contractions. In History they studied Boudica and her story. The children looked at Roman houses and had the chance to build their own Roman villa with underfloor heating in DT. They enjoyed our zoom P.E. session and have had the chance to have fun in our zoom session on Friday! The children studied the reasons for going on a pilgrimage in RE. As it was safer



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internet day on Tuesday, the children participated in a set of activities to strengthen their awareness of internet safety.

Ruby Class This week in Maths, Ruby Class have been working on perimeter and area, even getting outside in the snow and frost to measure the perimeters of spaces and objects using both standard and non-standard units of measurement - whether this was with measuring tapes, metre sticks, umbrellas, cuddly snakes or stretched out cats... In English, the children have been writing recounts from the perspective of Annie Edson Taylor and using freeze frames to help them get into her shoes.

We have also continued reading Odd & the Frost Giants, using our inference skills to gather information about a character using only a few words, and have been writing reviews of the books we have been reading independently. In Art, the children have been learning about the life and work of Henri Matisse. Following Miss Moore's guidance, they have created pieces in his style and have begun to research other influential artists of their choosing. In celebration of Chinese New Year, the children have found out what their Chinese zodiac sign is (either metal tiger or metal rabbit) and have created sculptures of these animals using metallic objects around the house. They have also, as part of our topic work, been researching and writing fact files about the Roman gods associated with the day of the week they were born.

Diamond Class This week in Year 6, we have been looking at what makes a good leader and have been thinking about how we can use quotes from Gandhi to make the world a better place. We have been writing reports about the endangered animal the kakapo, which is the largest parrot in the world, and we are busy planning our reports all about tigers. We have been doing some research using the San Diego Zoo website and have been amazed to see a platypus, polar bears, tigers, pandas and koala bears on the live webcams! We have also been out on a bug hunt in the lovely sunny weather to learn all about invertebrates.
