The 5 'R's

As a school we are concentrating on the 5 'R's – **resilience**, **reflectiveness**, **responsibility**, **resourcefulness and readiness to learn**. These are the children who have shown such qualities this week: **Resilience**: Alexander Hodson and Toby Le Grice **Responsibility**: Bodhi Scott, Megan Chesters and Elliott Weaver **Resourcefulness**: Harriet Hollins

<u>School</u>

Amethyst Class: In Amethyst class this week, we have read 'Peace at Last' by Jill Murphy and looked at information books about Houses and Homes. We talked about bedtime routines and found out about nocturnal animals. In maths, we built on the children's 'subitising' skills (instant recognition of the number of objects without counting them) We played skittles, compared dice spots and counted Baby Bears toys. We also had great fun playing with our new Year 6 Buddies.

Sapphire Class: This week we have worked hard on our writing skills. We have been looking at clues for our new story we are reading and writing predictions. In Art we have enjoyed creating a whole class piece based on the sea. In Science the children have also been talking about the human body. We have discussed and labelled the human body and talked about the jobs each body part does (arms, legs, head, ears, nose, mouth, feet, neck, knees, ankles and wrists).

Pearl Class: This week the children have been on a materials hunt to look for items around school made from wood, plastic, glass and metal. We have discussed the properties of these materials e.g. hard, transparent, flexible. The children have continued reading 'Troll Swap' and have compared Tabitha to Horrid Henry, looking for similarities and differences. We have partitioned numbers to 100 and practised writing numbers to 100 in













words. In music we have developed the 'London's Burning' song to perform it as a round. We have learnt about 'The Lost Sheep' in RE and used our story maps from last week to rewrite the parable.

Amber Class: Year 3 have worked on partitioning 3 digit numbers in their maths lessons this week. In English, they have learned how to use prepositions for time and place. Additionally, they have started to write their information reports about seals. The children peeled and stewed apples with spices in forest school when they were exploring foraging as a way of getting food. The children investigated what tools were used in The Stone Age and also experimented with mark making using natural materials such as berries, grasses and burnt wood. The class worked on their French, swimming and also tag rugby skills in PE. The children explored what Jewish people believe about God and they practised scaling up artworks in art to draw large charcoal animals. They looked at public information design in DT and inputs and outputs in computing.

Emerald Class: This week, Emerald Class have been building series circuits and learning about how electricity works. They have changed the brightness of bulbs and have built a switch, in DT, to turn their bulbs on and off. In RE, the children have been learning about the parable of The Good Samaritan and have been thinking of ways to help others in need. The children have also enjoyed creating 3D effects using paint by using tints and shades.

Ruby Class: This week in Ruby class, the children have been working hard in English. They have written a description about Niagara Falls as if they were Annie Edson Taylor, thinking carefully about what they can see, hear and feel. During maths, we have looked at partitioning numbers up to 1,000,000 as well as being able to precisely plot larger numbers on a number line. In this week's science lesson, we have started to look at fiction and sorting objects that cause a lot of friction and ones that don't as well as explaining when and where friction can be useful. In RE, we have been learning about the many Hindu gods and how they represent the powers of the supreme soul Brahman. PE continues to go well with the children mastering throwing, catching and tackling (by pulling the other players tags).

Diamond Class: This week in Diamond Class, the children have been rounding six and seven digit numbers to various powers of 10. In English, we have been looking at different types of the past tense and the difference between active and passive voice. We also had our first glimpse of a past SATs reading paper. In History, we researched the life of Winston Churchill and used playdough to help us see the extent of the invasions that occurred during the first two years of WW2. In Art, we learnt about Portuguese-British artist, Paula Rego, and created a plan for a story surrounding her painting 'The Dance'. We also reminded ourselves about Team HAP (three important sections of the brain - the hippocampus, the amygdala and the prefrontal cortex) and their roles, in MyHappyMind. In RE, we will be learning about the Hindu principle of Ahimsa and the real-life story of Shambo the Cow.
