
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Praise Book Children



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School

All the children have been getting ready for returning to school with their classes by talking about how they are feeling and what they are looking forward to. The children have been doing lots of work on World Book Day over the last few days by looking at different books and discussing the settings and characters within each one.

Stay at Home Heroes

Amethyst Class This week in Amethyst Class we have read the story Superworm by Julia Donaldson. We have learnt facts about worms and written a new clue for our "What am I?" game. In maths, we have been comparing numbers to ten, learnt number bonds to ten using a tens frame and sorted dominoes in to more and less. We have also continued our Read Write Inc phonics lessons online and worked hard to earn more coins on Numbots.

Sapphire Class This week the children in Sapphire have enjoyed sharing the online stories to help us celebrate World Book Day. The children have been sharing their thoughts about returning to school next week. In Maths the children have been learning to count in 5's. In science, the children have been thinking about clues to describe different animals. In geography, the children have been using directional language to plan routes around their houses and gardens.

Pearl Class In Pearl Class, the children shared a special reading activity each day in preparation for World Book Day. They took part in the online Author and Illustrator Academy, learning how to make a Picture Book Theatre with Lydia Monks and create a dragon using a potato with Joseph Coelho and Fiona Lumbers. The children listened to dragon stories with Mrs Richardson and Mrs Smith in preparation for a fantastic dragon quiz. They thoroughly enjoyed our special story telling event with Alia Alzougbi from Settle Stories who told tales from the Arabian Nights. On World Book Day, the children created their own interactive book inspired by Tom Fletcher's 'There's a wolf in my book.' In English, the children created a new character for an extended story activity and in Maths, they used repeated addition when calculating. In History, the children became detectives and researched artefacts to discover how they were used in farming. They also created their own artwork in the style of Vincent van Gogh.

Amber Class World Book Day has seen Amber class enjoying a whole host of book-related activities this week! We have met an author online who read some amazing stories from 1001 Arabian Nights to us. We have shared our favourite stories and made our own bookmarks. Mr Davies even read his favourite story about a dancing giraffe called Gerald to us! In maths we continued with our work on measurements and we also used a technique called 'pointillism' (pioneered by Georges Seurat) to make our own rainforest-inspired art.



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Emerald Class This week the class completed their perimeters topic in Maths. In English they looked at using the 'show not tell' technique for descriptions and persuasive writing. The children studied Roman bathhouses and the legacy the Romans left behind in Britain in History. In RE they investigated Muslim pilgrimages. As it was World Book Day this week, the children have completed a variety of activities to celebrate, including attending a live performance on Wednesday and attending the author and illustrator academy. They also entered the design a book token competition.

Ruby Class In maths this week, Ruby Class have continued to work on angles - using protractors to measure degrees both on paper and in the wild during a Wild Angle Adventure. In English, we have been writing entries for 'Goodnight Stories for Rebel Girls' about Annie Edson Taylor - focusing on our use of fronted adverbials and subordinate conjunctions. As it has been World Book Week, we have been focusing on our love for reading. We have been dressing ourselves (as well as vegetables) as book characters and sharing our favourite passages from our favourite books. We then created our own bookmarks using an online programme. We have watched masterclasses from famous authors as well as a fantastic live performance of Arabian Nights.

In Reading, we have continued with Odd & The Frost Giants, focusing on making comparisons within the book and across the book with Norse mythology, and listened to Mr Blenkiron reading (and occasionally singing...) The Hobbit. In Science, the children have been learning about the different ways in which plants disperse their seeds and have imagined themselves as a plant choosing the best way to spread their seeds based on where they are located. The children have been comparing the Ancient Greek gods with the Roman gods; even creating their own based on their hobbies and interests!

Diamond Class This week in Year 6, we have been learning about the Mexican festival of the Day of the Dead. We have been making skull masks and 3d models as well, and some of us have been baking Mexican bread! We have also been celebrating World Book day by learning about the author Katherine Rundell and have been taking part in her writing challenge: to write our own prequels; we look forward to sharing them in school next week. We have been learning about measures in maths, and in reading, we have been learning all about the Amazon Rainforest. We have also been thinking about how to make sure we are ready and organised for school next week; some of us may need an alarm clock!
